MOTHERS' UNION CELEBRATES 140 YEARS



2016 sees the world's largest lay-Christian membership charity, **Mothers' Union**, mark 140 years of faithful outreach to families. Since 1876, when Mary Sumner first brought together parents in her own Hampshire parish to build their confidence in bringing up their children, it has grown to an organisation of over four million women – and men – in over 80 countries around the world.

Mothers' Union Worldwide is today recognised by the United Nations as a leading mission organisation, meeting the needs of people in their communities and regarded by the previous Archbishop of Canterbury as the fifth instrument of unity within the Anglican Communion.

The first branch formed in

Australia was in Tasmania in 1882, and at Blackall in the Rockhampton Diocese in 1911.

As part of the worldwide celebrations, we had a special service for Lady Day (4th April) and will do likewise for Mary Sumner Day (9th August). Apart from our work with Baptismal families, our main Diocesan focus is in raising awareness of domestic violence, especially in advocating for a Safe House on the Capricorn Coast. Last year Mothers Union and Caritas raised almost \$1,000 for drought-affected families in the far west.

For 140 years Mothers' Union members have been lights in the world as they have shared the love of God through their witness and service. Faith has lain at the heart of Mothers' Union since its founding, and it will fire our determination to continue to trust in God for all that lies ahead for us in the future.


Christ is Risen! Alleluia!!

Easter, a celebration of hope, of the power of God to bring life out of death.

We were very fortunate, this year, to be able to celebrate Easter services in the far west of the Diocese. Easter Eve we shared in the Lighting of the New Fire at Winton and then on Easter Day we took part in Easter services at Boulia and Bedourie. It was a joy to be with the people of God in each of these communities and to worship with them, recalling the power and grace of God revealed in the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The journey out west was one of contrasts. The drought persists in large parts of the Diocese with many families suffering great hardship. How frustrating and demoralising it must be when your property is in drought while others, just a few kilometres away, are lush and green. The images below help show this contrast.

Still, there is no doubt seeing green grass lifts the spirit and brings a hope to others that the rain will come and the drought will end.

As I reflect on the journey of faith, I am conscious that we can all go through periods of drought – spiritual drought, times when God seems distant and uncaring and then times of drenching refreshing and renewing rain – **a fresh out pouring of God's Holy Spirit.**

During the times of spiritual drought we need hope. Hope can be provided by our sisters and brothers in Christ – those who are the green fields reminding us that our drought is not unending, that the water of life continues to flow and refresh those who put their faith in Jesus.

Jesus speaks of himself as living water (John 4), a referral to the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on all who **believe. It was an outpouring that came about only after Jesus' death and resurrection. Many Biblical images of water – rivers flowing out of God's kingdom – are images of the consummation of God's kingdom. Images of renewal following times of hardship, times of drought.**

As we begin our journey towards Pentecost and the celebration of God's spirit poured out on all creation, we pray that God would fill us anew with the Holy Spirit. May we become like fields of green grass, filled with hope and living witnesses to the truth of our Easter proclamation: Christ is risen. Alleluia!

CANTERBURY TALES

There is something very profound in visiting a small church on the outskirts of Canterbury, founded in the 4th century, that is the oldest church in the English speaking world. While it is somewhat overshadowed by the majesty of Canterbury Cathedral, the Parish Church of St Martin served to remind me of the countless un-named saints who have gone before us, living out their faith, calling others to follow Christ, because in him they have found the freedom and joy of eternal life.

As Christians we sit in a timeline that stretches all the way back to God's act of creation and all the way forward to God's new creation, the new heavens and a new earth. In the middle of these two great events is the death and resurrection of Jesus. We are part of a story of faith that spans millennia and, while at different times in our history we might feel overwhelmed by events that surround us, there is an element of strength, of timelessness, of being part of a much bigger story, the story of God, working through his people, to make his love known and his kingdom present here and now.

I was also very privileged to meet and share with 27 bishops, from many different lands, and to hear something of their stories. The Bishop of Sierra Leone, who spoke of the struggles of ministry during the Ebola outbreak; stories from the Bishops of the Sudan about how they regularly take food and medicines into rebel held territories where no-one else will go; and of the Bishops of North India as they spoke of the increasing persecution of Christians in their dioceses.

It is sobering to think about how so many of our sisters and brothers in Christ face persecution and death for their faith. Yet, in the face of great odds and with enormous courage, they continue to proclaim Jesus died and risen in order that others might share in eternal life. Their lives, which bear witness to the **power of God's Holy Spirit, challenge us to think about our lives, our commitment to the call God has placed before us.** May we be filled with the Holy Spirit to proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. (1 Cor 1:23ff)

with 17 participants. Late in the year we aim to have a Youth Alpha Course for the first time.



THE SEE ENDOWMENT FUND

When the Diocese of Rockhampton was excised from the Diocese of Brisbane and established in 1892 it was hoped that a See Endowment Fund would be fully subscribed. Such a fund was put in place to make sure that the cost of having a Bishop of Rockhampton Diocese would be assured and not require support from the Diocesan budget. Unfortunately the fund was never fully established and the Diocese has had to live with that for the last 123 years. The fund however still exists, and income that is earned from capital invested becomes part of the annual budget for the Bishopric. The Diocese would be greatly assisted if, over 123 years later, the fund received new gifts and bequests from benefactors. Gifts can be made to the Diocese of Rockhampton, PO Box 710, Rockhampton QLD 4700 and bequests should be worded: *"I bequeath to the Corporation of the Synod of the Diocese of Rockhampton for the purpose of the See Endowment Fund."*

Susan is an Occupational Therapist by profession and has worked for NSW Health as a Child and Adolescent Mental Health worker for the past five years.

They look forward to forming relationships with those in the community.

"Under God this appointment represents an exciting step forward in advancing **BCA's current priorities,**" says National Director Mark Short. ANGLICARECO'S ROCKHAMPTON TEAM UNITED IN NEW BUILDING

Anglicare Central Queensland's new office in Musgrave Street is now open for business, bringing all the organisation's services in Rockhampton together in one central location.

The striking new building at 160 Musgrave Street has been custom built by the Anglican Diocese of Rockhampton to deliver much-needed community services including mental health, counselling and **family support**. It also houses AnglicareCO's management, administration and finance teams.

The existing AnglicareCO building next door at 164 Musgrave Street will continue to operate as usual, and is the hub for the agency's housing services and child protection programs including foster care.

The move brings together more than 30 AnglicareCO staff from the now-closed offices in Quay St and Fitzroy Street, making it simpler and easier for Rockhampton residents to access the service they need.
